Real Life Curiosity

Researchers suggest that children are now playing in an over plastic environment and unreal world. When a child sits down to eat they use plastic plates, they play with plastic food and dress up in fantasy clothing. Here at nursery we like to use 'real life' clothing in our dressing up, real life provocations in the home corner such as china cups, metal teapots, real food and real tools in the outside area.

The benefits of this type of play is that children will act out life real life situations, increase motivation for play, improve behaviour, develop language and communication, develop understanding of the real world (children will feel the differences for example in a metal cup and a china cup) and progress their mathematical development (shape, size, measurement, weight).

Practitioners will model to the children what happens if we drop a cup and it breaks, how will we clear up the mess to make it safe again? Can we repair it? Should we be more careful?

We have a small amount of real life items but if you or grandparents are having a clear out please consider us. I would love some old fashioned suitcases, brasses, mug trees, curtain rings for example. If you have any questions please come and speak to me.
